Mandela International Day – Courage, Equality & Service

Objective:

To help students learn about the life and values of Nelson Mandela while developing reading, inquiry, empathy, and reflection skills through guided use of the Britannica Library.



Students will:

- Understand who Nelson Mandela was and why he is remembered
- Learn about equality, freedom, and human rights
- Develop reading comprehension and research skills
- Reflect on leadership, courage, and service to society
- Build empathy and a sense of responsible citizenship

Introduce the Weekly Theme / Genre:

Begin with a class discussion:

- Who is a leader?
- What does freedom mean to you?
- Can one person bring change in society?

Explain that Mandela International Day is observed on 18 July to honour Nelson Mandela's life and encourage people to serve others and stand up for equality.

Suggested Activities by Grade Band

Grades I & II

- Students begin by exploring pictures and short readings from the Britannica Library about inspiring global figures and achievements. Encourage them to observe, read, and discuss key ideas.
- Students explore topics such as:
 - Nelson Mandela (his life and contributions)
 - Nobel Peace Prize (what it represents and why it is awarded)
- You may guide them using prompts like:
 - Who was Nelson Mandela?
 - What challenges did he face?
 - What is the Nobel Peace Prize and why is it important?
- Students will create a bubble web using words they feel best describe Nelson Mandela (e.g., brave, kind, leader, fair)
