International Youth Day: The Power of Youth

Objective:

To develop students' reading, observation, and inquiry skills by exploring the potential of young people to drive social change, while strengthening independent use of the Britannica Library during library periods.



Students will:

- Recognize the importance of youth voices in solving global challenges
- Discover historical and modern examples of young leaders
- Learn to use Britannica's "Biographies" and "Global Issues" sections to gather evidence
- Develop a sense of agency and confidence in contributing to their communities

Introduce the Weekly Theme / Genre:

Begin with a class discussion:

- Can young people change the world?
- What is one problem you would like to solve?
- Do you know any young leaders or change-makers?

Explain that International Youth Day (12 August) celebrates the ideas, energy, and leadership of young people across the world.

Suggested Activities by Grade Band

Grades I & II

- Students begin by exploring simple and meaningful ways to help others and care for the environment. Encourage them to observe, discuss, and connect these ideas to their daily lives.
- Students explore topics such as:
 - Helping others (sharing, kindness, cooperation)
 - Caring for the environment (recycling, saving resources, cleanliness)
- Students will express their ideas through creativity and writing.
- They will draw a “Superhero” version of themselves helping the world
- Show actions like helping others, saving nature, or keeping surroundings clean
- Write a few lines describing their good action and how it helps others
- Encourage them to use colours, imagination, and simple sentences.
