In providing resources to middle school students, it's critical to be able to point them to information that is safe and reliable and where the teacher has complete confidence that students will find what they need. With so much information out there, it's important that we as library media specialists identify and promote the great resources we can provide access to. I take pride in knowing the best tools and sharing them. That's why I turn to Britannica School as a key resource for my middle school.

Located in northeast Georgia, the East Hall Middle School serves approximately 1,000 students in grades six through eight. The school has access to *Britannica School** through GALILEO, a statewide-initiative that provides Georgia residents with access to authoritative, subscription-only information.

According to Jennifer Parker, School Library Media Specialist, *Britannica School* is most frequently used by students whose teachers have guided them there for their research projects. Parker said middle school students respond well to guided research because they like knowing a resource will produce the desired results. They can give students a URL link to those pages to access the high-quality content that the teacher has preselected for student use. "Working with teachers on Lesson Plan Builder definitely helps build a relationship between the library media specialist and teachers," she said. "Educating teachers on how this tool works and the power of it is an important part of what I do."
